

One hundred years ago March 1st the first stone of the present structure of Canton Lodge was placed in position when nine members of the fraternity met under dispensation. The members attending that first meeting were; Moses Andrews, W. M., James Drennan, S. W., B. C. Goodwill, J. W., James W. Lathrop, Sec., Timothy Reed, Treas., John Whipple, S. D., Josiah Brown, tyler, Oren Pitkin and Aaron Norton. All business in those days was transacted in the E. A. degree, the lodge being opened in the F. C. and M. M. degrees only for the purpose of conferring those degrees. From this humble beginning we have Canton Lodge of today with over 1200 members.

That this event should be fittingly celebrated is beyond question and to this end the following committees are devoting their best energies: General committee, H. R. Bauhof, W. P. Beardsley, C. A. Stolberg. Speakers' committee, A. C. Eynon, Herman D. Myers, A. A. Welsbacher. Decorating committee, Percy Dittenhafer, Brady Hawk, J. Lee Govan:" Music committee, August Gronau, Jr., Chas. E. Norris, Kirby M. Snyder. Program and Invitation committee, Herman De Vol, 'Walter Buchman, Abram Diefenbach, Herman Myers. Reception committee will be composed of the officers and all available past masters of Canton lodge.

The Centennial celebration will open on Tuesday evening, March 1, when all past masters, masters, wardens and secretaries in the county are expected to be present at the Temple. Special invitations will be sent to those ex-pected to attend this opening meeting called for 5:30. After registration a banquet will follow. The evening will be devoted to suitable talks from among those present who have been active in Masonic work in this county, review of the work done 100 years ago as revealed in the minutes and the presentation of past masters' jewels.

On Wednesday afternoon, March 2^{nd} , commencing at 1:30 o'clock the E. A. and F. C. degrees will be conferred by the officers of Canton lodge to which all resident Masons

The sun of Masonry will rise in the east, bright and early on Monday, Feb. 28th, for the Grotto Ceremonial and will not set in the west until nearly midnight the following Friday. It will be a week of good fellowship and every Mason should esteem it an honor and a high privilege to attend such functions as are provided for his entertainment by the committees.

Editors note: You will note the use of the, so called "Commandery Room." Copmmandery No. 38 was a very large Body in Masonry in 1921 consisting of hundreds of Sir Knights. They utilized and practiced on their own floor located in the W. T. Grant Building, which was also utilized by other Masonic bodies for large gatherings and sometimes degree work for really large crowds. You may also recognize some prominent Canton names on the committees and lodge officers. Herman D. Myers and James W. Lathrop are two that will appear many times as we progress into the 20th Century of Masonry.

"The Path Forward;" a Special Report

Have you read or glanced through "The Path Forward;" a Special Report and Member Survey Results? It was packaged with the November 2017 "Northern Light." Now, if you read through it great; if you did not, you missed several Masonic questions facing the fraternity today and it seems many of these same questions have plagued the fraternity for eons; and now the Scottish Rite, Northern Jurisdiction, is trying to bring these problems to light. Although the methods of gathering the information may be questionable, poling one thousand brethren and assuming a general cross section my not be quite accurate but the results may be considered valid and taken as an indicator to what troubles Masonry today. The average age of Masons today is 65 years. Not a startling fact but believable. Even at their age, Boomers are still the best target for membership because of their core values. Millennia's seek instant gratification not wishing for long indoctrination into membership and loose interest quickly regarding long range plans. Boomers still believe personal interaction and visitation between people is much better than any form of electronic communication even though many employ it for pleasure. The younger members complain, but still understand and tolerate. too a point, the bullying of older members towards management operations, ritual and degree work perfection because of Masonry's built in respect for age; the Master Masons teach, but chances are great this may be hurting our attendance. The report goes on to indicate that nearly 50 percent of those polled wanted to see more "open minded" leadership in both Blue Lodge and Scottish Rite. The rank-and-file love the fraternity but feel it is some what out of touch with today fast pace society but still want to maintain the values Masonry teaches to young members. Six out of ten of the average 65 year old Masons use some form of social media for entertainment and communication and the report cheered and praised this fact; one e-mail on several social media sites could reach 60 percent of it members quickly. This point I found to be the most disturbing. What about the other 40 percent who do not use social media for a variety of reasons, and who buy the way, are also dues paying members. Removing their participation would spell sudden death for any organization. The written word is still the preferred method of communication guaranteeing to reach 100 percent of your

target audience; that's one reason this report was printed and distributed to all who receive the Northern Light. Now what we need is for everyone to read it because of the many I have asked about this report, only a few even acknowledged seeing the thing!

Could History Repeat Itself in 2018? *Page Four, November 1918 Masonic Bulletin*

The "flu ban" which was put on public gatherings October 11th 1918 was lifted for Sunday, Dec. 1st 1918 and it is to be hoped that conditions will continue to im-prove so that it will not be necessary to again "clamp down the lid." Unless something unforeseen develops all regular December meetings will be held, with several specials as soon as can be arranged to clear up accumulated work. Let's all resume labor with renewed vim after this forced six weeks vacation.

The "Flu ban" prevented the annual election of officers of the local Blue Lodges but they have received special dispensations to hold their elections at the first stated communication following the lifting of the ban.

ONIONS! I had never heard this!!!

PLEASE READ TO THE END: IMPORTANT

In 1919 when the flu killed 40 million people there was this Doctor who visited the many farmers to see if he could help them combat the flu. Many of the farmers and their families had contracted it and many died. The doctor came upon one farmer and to his surprise, everyone was very healthy. Asked what the farmer was doing that was different the wife replied: she had placed an unpeeled onion in a dish in the rooms of their home (probably only two rooms back then.) The doctor couldn't believe it and asked if he could have one of the onions and place it under the microscope; and when he did this, he found the flu virus in the onion. It obviously absorbed the bacteria, therefore, keeping the family safe and healthy.

Now, I heard this story from a hairdresser. She said that several years ago, many of her employees and customers were coming down with the flu. The next year she placed several bowls with onions around in her shop. To her surprise, none of her staff got sick. "It must work. Try it and see what happens." So we did it last year and we never got the flu. Now there is a P. S. to this story. I sent it to a friend in Oregon who regularly contributes material to me on health issues. She replied with this most interesting experience about onions: She contacted pneumonia, and, needless to say, she was very ill. She came across an article that said to cut both ends off an onion put it into an empty jar, and place the jar next to the sick patient at night. It said the onion would be black in the


morning from the germs...sure enough it happened just like that...the onion was a mess and she began to feel better. Another thing she read in the article was that onions and garlic placed around the room saved many from the black plague years ago. They have powerful antibacterial, antiseptic properties.

Onions absorbing bacteria is the reason they are so good at preventing us from getting colds and flu and is the very reason we should never eat an onion that has been sitting for a time after it has been cut open.

LEFT OVER ONIONS ARE POISONOUS!

I had the wonderful privilege of touring Mullins Food Products, makers of mayonnaise products. Questions about food poisoning came up, and I wanted to share what I learned from a chemist named Ed, who was our tour guide and a food chemistry whiz at Mullins Food Products. During the tour someone asked if we really needed to worry about mayonnaise spoiling. Ed's answer will surprise you. Ed said that all commercially-made mayo is completely safe; it doesn't even need refrigeration, no harm in refrigerating it but, it's not really necessary! He explained that the pH in mayonnaise is set at a point that bacteria could not survive in that environment. Ed says that, when food poisoning is reported, the first thing the officials look for is when the 'victim' last ate ONIONS and where those onions came from (potato salad?) Ed says it's not the mayonnaise (as long as it's not homemade mayo.) It's probably the ONIONS, and if not the onions, it's the potatoes. Onions are a huge magnet for bacteria, especially uncooked. You should never keep a portion of a sliced onion; it's not even safe if you put it in a zip-lock bag it in your refrigerator. It's already contaminated just by being cut open and out and this it can be a danger to you; and doubly watch out for those onions you put in your hotdogs at the baseball park! Cooking leftover onion like crazy you'll probably be okay, but if you slice that leftover onion and put on your sandwich, you're asking for trouble. Also, dogs should never eat onions; their stomachs cannot metabolize onions. Remember it is dangerous to cut an onion and try to use it to cook the next day, it becomes highly poisonous for even a single night and creates toxic bacteria which may cause adverse stomach infections because of excess bile secretions and even food poisoning.


