This statute talks about "ye airt of memorie" or "the art of memory" which is the study of mnemonic principles to help organize memory impressions and improve recall. The techniques associated with the art of memory are striking visual images along with study. It has been suggested this art started with the Pythagoreans or even the ancient Egyptians.

Templar farms and other lands were grouped into Commanderies, which were larger manors that administered several lesser holdings. Commanderies in Britain were on flat or gently rolling land and often sited on rivers for good transportation.



Officers and several members attended the last stated meeting and awards dinner of Lathrop Lodge, 8th. Bro. Vernon Best Januarv received a 65 year award, W.B. Robert Rhodes a 50 year award and W.B. Frank Turner a 25 year award. present to assist in presentations were R.W.

Sekeres and R.W. James G. Fiddler representing Most Worshipful Ronald Winnett, Grand Master of Masons in Ohio.

After dinner we retired to the Blue Lodge Room for the final stated meeting where W.M. Gary E. Eubank opened lodge with W.B. Al Phillips (Canton 60), S.W.; Bro. Gary R. Gruber, J.W.; W.B. David B. Newkirk, Secretary; Bro. Jim Barnett, Treasurer; W.B. Ed Cox (Trinity 710), S.D.; W.B. Rodney Anderson (Trinity 710), J.D.; R.W. Thomas White, Chaplain and Bro. James E. Selig, Tyler.

After old business and tying up loose ends and final reports, W.M. Eubank asked for any last comments from the brethren. The mood being somber, few spoke. W.M. Eubank then asked if I had any comments. I offered a warm welcome to all the members of Lathrop Lodge. R.W. Thomas White assisted by R.W. Earl Blazer at the organ, passed out sheets with the lyrics to "Memories". We stood and sang three verses of which the last two had been rewritten for Lathrop Lodge. W.M. Now we move on to page 5.

Lathrop's Page.

On the front page of this publication is a statement: "Published since 1918 by the Masonic Bodies of Canton, Ohio." Ninety years of news and views and for the past eighty seven of those years this page has been reserved for Lathrop Lodge No. 676. Today, because of apathy, indifference, indecision and absence the Master's picture is gone. The Officers names and telephone numbers are all gone. The square and compasses are gone. Only the "cut line" remains as a vivid reminder, that this was the Bulletin page of a lodge who the majority of its 255 members abandoned their commitments for TV reality shows and more exciting endeavors in their lives. The Master pleaded for months for help of which little was forthcoming. Brethren, this is no way to celebrate the bicentennial of Freemasonry in Ohio.

Let me now refer you to a rather obscure page located in the 2008, 21st Masonic District Calendar Booklet now being distributed. Page 23 starts with: "NOTE" and goes on to read: 1989, J. E. McFadden Lodge No. 697 consolidates with Conrad Lodge No. 271; 1991, Ashlar Lodge No. 639 moved into the 21st Masonic District, a plus; 1997, Ernest F. Schaefer Lodge & W. Edwin Palmer Lodge merge, change name to Old Portage Lodge No. 718; 1998, Henry Perkins Lodge consolidates - 1999, Loyalty Lodge consolidates and the page continues. 2000, Fidelity Lodge consolidates - 2000, Tallmadge Lodge - 2001, Joppa Lodge - and we continue on. 2002, Old Portage Lodge - 2004, Coventry Lodge - 2005, Lone Star Lodge - 2005, Amos H. Englebeck Lodge and this year, Lathrop Lodge becomes a statistic in this blight of apathy and absence.

Months ago Bulletin President, Ed Cox, asked me for room in the next edition for an editorial he thought necessary to publish. "An Unsolicited Editorial" page 13, May 2006, appeared. Perhaps you remember? It asked a pointed question. Simply stated, where are you? Rebuttals were invited. All agreed with his article. And so it was with the few comments received. The one exception (did not give his lodge or permission for his letter to be published) was he found interest in other organizations more rewarding. "Lifestyle change, social activities, friends and golf" were also noted. A recent comment by a non-active Brother revealed the regret of time. Freemasonry is not free. You can't step in and out at your will. Challenging to become and an even greater task to remain,

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you are a Mason for life. Apathy and absence are results of laziness, not of time. The idea this fraternity will outlast you is no longer valid. Your commitment to Freemasonry will find time. Many who are living full family and church lives find the time. Your lodge needs your attendance and participation. Grand Master Winnett wrote in a letter circulated to every Mason in Ohio; "It's time to wake that sleeping giant." Wake up! Get involved! If this article makes you a bit hot under the colar, great! You give the Cleveland Browns one or two evenings a month, why not your lodge? You knelt at the altar of Masonry and pledged your support. It's time to honor your pledge. Masonry is service and privilege. Share that privilege. Introduce others to service, life style changes, God, country, social events and yes, even golf. This absence must stop. It is not Masonic.

We do expect your comments, good and bad. Permit us to use them in the Bulletin. Go back to lodge. Introduce a friend to Masonry and for heavens sake, get involved again.





Centennial of the Masonic Bulletin Howit's produced, printed and distributed:

October 100 years ago, the first issue of this publication was delivered to the Masonic families and the boys in the trenches serving in the First World War. Masonry was the same fraternity although the members were very different. Life was simple in those days. There was no television, cell phones or terrorists threatening our way of life. News was several days old reaching you by radio broadcast or written in daily newspapers. Fast breaking news was distributed by "Paper Boys" who stood on corners selling papers by yelling "extra, extra," when there was an organized crime murder, or important news from the trenches. It was quite exciting to hear and people flocked to purchase papers. The "Mob," as they were called, was the only real threat to the simple life of the ordinary citizen who worked every day, was paid in cash by the "Pay Master" who stood with the prepared weekly envelopes. Entertainment consisted of: the Palace or Lowe's Theaters, vaudeville on stage or the Strand or Ohio Theaters for on screen movies, the Civic Opera or Orchestra, at the Canton Civic Auditorium, now long gone; or maybe the Masonic Temple or Jewish Center. People committed to projects and used their natural talents completing monumental tasks that would take computer space and hours of time and money to accomplish today. If the Worshipful Master asked and there was a need, you got many volunteers; and so it was with the Bulletin in 1918. Thereto-for Masonic news was published in the Canton newspapers reaching those who got the paper. Masonry was a closed organization in those days. Many men, heads-of-households, never divulged to their families they were active in Masonry. The families came to the Masonic Building only when there were parties at Christmas or large gathering; therefore the newspaper articles were at best, vague and lacked detail. So the Bulletin was born in hopes of ending brethren not being informed properly. Also the gossip of the Temple could now be divulged to the brethren without the public becoming involved. The smallest "tidbits" to the most monumental projects were detailed in the Bulletin several of which have re-appeared recently in this publication.

The Masonic Bulletin endured changes over the years. In the days of reporters, there was a tendency to embellish their writing with personal comments, distorting the articles much like the media does today, omitting or adding and sometimes shading the actual real truth. This is when the lodges elected to write their own articles; ending reporter personal politics. Editors were brought to task by the Masters. I witnessed articles changed or omitted by editors who did not agree with there context; and when this was brought to the attention of higher ups, you may have been informed the Editor was in the "clique," so don't make waves. Next months issue may set things straight! In those days, the Canton Masonic Temple was controlled by a handful of older Brethren and their authority was not to be challenged. We strive to dwell on future events using the space to inform rather than rehash. Every writer has a unique style and we try to allow their styles to be exhibited only changing text when clarity of subject is in question or substituting words for longer phrases

to gain space. Many of the brethren in launching this publication were affiliated with the newspaper industry and had an inside track on printing. All printed material in those days was "typeset" with lead letters called "font." The Typesetter" who was a spelling expert, sat this font in boxes at an alarming rate. Newspapers were printed in narrow columns because of this. The "Off-set" printing method and "Mimeograph" machines came later and of course were utilized by the publication staff. These methods utilized the "storyboard" past method of preparing copy for printing. "Remington Rend" developed a typewriter which "justified" type, both ends of all lines were even, this typed copy could be pasted creating the image which was burned onto the printing master. The computer publication is a relatively new process where the copy is created in a computer program, than burned onto an aluminum plate which is used as the print media. In the case of the Bulletin, and this is quite interesting, the entire booklet is printed on one sheet of paper both sides, folded, stitched and trimmed around three sides and "Walla," we have a booklet. Programming has enhanced the process a great deal. It is faster and now the entire publication can be viewed on screen before a printed proof. Mistakes, and there a lots, can be corrected before a printing press is needed. Articles are received via e-mail or placed in the mail box, edited into the form viewed in the publication and fitted into their proper page. Advertisements are than placed and a Bulletin is born. Fewer hands are needed to produce it today, lowering cost, proof reading time and mistakes, although they are still present.

Addressing is always the "millstone" around the Bulletin Committee's neck. Because this process requires accuracy of others so this step is generally a nightmare! In the beginning employees with good penmanship addressed the mailings. It was believed that envelopes were used because they could be addressed in advance. Later the committee purchased a new ingenious machine for addressing and it was installed at the Masonic Temple. It was called an "Address-o-graph-multi-graph" machine. My Lord! What a contraption. Belts, levers, gears and chains all connected to an electric motor. Embossed lead plates were moved over an inked ribbon with a Bulletin beneath. A stomper came down and pressed the plate onto the paper. These plates were stored in long boxes and fed into position by means of levers. They often missed and flew across the room and were placed by hand. This machine was revolutionary! It did in days what workers tool weeks to do plus it could separate lodges, cities and postal zones. This equipment was used into the early 2000's when computerized mailing lists were introduced. Operating this machine for a hour, you had ink on your hands and face, grease and oil on your clothing. Each article is spell checked, dates confirmed, edited for grammar, and placed onto the proper page. Advertisements inserted, front page designed for symmetry than; the whole thing is sent for proofing and printing. After corrections the file goes for the printing and distribution. This is the abbreviated process which takes place each month of publication and it all happen in 15 business days assuring your copy is in your mail box by the end of the month.


